GRAMMAR FOCUS conditional sentences to talk about unreal situations

Unreal conditional (or 'second conditional')

We use if + past, + would/might/could + infinitive to talk about an unreal or improbable situation in the present or future, and how things could be different.

If our flat was bigger, the children would have a room each.

Unreal past conditional (or 'third conditional')

We use if + past perfect, + would/might/could have + participle to talk about an unreal situation in the past, to say how it could have been different.

If we hadn't worked together, we might not have met. b

Mixed conditionals

We can mix the second and third conditionals in two ways: to talk about an unreal situation in the past which has a present result, we use:

if + past perfect, + would If you'd listened properly, you'd know what to do.

to talk about the possible past result of an unreal situation in the present, we use:

if + past, + would have If he was more confident, he'd have asked her out.
